## You're Invited to the BLUE CHRISTMAS SERVICE

Christmas is often thought of as a time for parties, gift-giving, concerts, carols, visits with friends and family, decorations, and the joy of welcoming the Christ child into our world. However, there are times in our lives when Christmas is a painful time of grief, emptiness, or loneliness.

Perhaps you lost a loved one recently, and this is your first Christmas without them? Perhaps your loved one died around the holidays and you associate their loss with all the Christmas festivities? Perhaps you lost someone years ago, but Christmas never feels the same since? Perhaps you have had a loss of your sense of purpose, your home, a relationship, or sense of wholeness, and you aren't feeling the "Christmas cheer" this year.

Blue Christmas acknowledges the grief experienced by those mourning the death of a loved one, the sadness of a broken relationship, the loneliness of having loved ones far away, the fear caused by a loss in health, the hopelessness related to the loss of a sense of purpose, or any circumstance that casts a shadow over us.

We will read scriptures that validate our pain and grief. And, we will read scriptures that remind us that Christ is our light in the darkness. Christ doesn't always take away the darkness, but Christ is our hope in the midst of a sometimes dark world.

Our Blue Christmas service will provide an opportunity to have your loved one or circumstance acknowledged. Blue Christmas worship will be a full worship service with a sermon, scriptures, songs, communion, prayers, and litanies. This unique service strives to be a meaningful worship opportunity to leave you with a sense of peace, comfort, and hope we have in Christ.

### GET TO KNOW YOUR NEIGHBOR A Blind Date Led to Love at First Sight

Bonjour! An engineer's wife, **Sharon Annen Fenske** (T400) was born in 1935. Her childhood was in the village of Pewaukee. Growing up, Sharon enjoyed the small town's lazy, hazy days of "summer feeling" with no hustle or bustle. She recalls many fun days fishing, swimming, and ice skating on the lake. Sharon walked daily to the elementary and high school from home. As a summer job, she picked strawberries, "one for the bucket, and one for me." She was raised in a musical family, playing the clarinet, commonly called the "licorice stick," and the piano.

She moved to Milwaukee to attend Spencerian Business College, riding the streetcar from her dorm. After graduation, she worked as a secretary at Wisconsin Pharmaceutical. She met Ron Fenske on a blind date. With a twinkle in her eye, she claimed it was "love at first sight." Ron was a mechanical engineer at General Motors. After marriage, they moved to Madison where she worked typing papers for doctors at the medical college. One day she had to retrieve a paper during a postmortem examination. The doctor couldn't hand her the paper until after his job. Sharon was not squeamish. She leaned against the wall for strength so she could slide down if she had to. She watched the entire autopsy.

They moved to Roanoke, Virginia, the first of many moves in their marriage lifetime as Ron crawled up the ladder of success. Sharon's secretarial days were traded for life as a "stay at home engineer." They had three living parents at the time, so they needed to stop living so far away. They decided to live in Indiana. Ron worked for 15 years at NASA's space program through General Motors.

After the children were gone from their nest, Ron and Sharon took French lessons to prepare for their move so Ron could work in Versailles, France.

There, Ron and his employees all spoke While English. he worked, Sharon learned to with the live French people. She joined a group of American women to herself busy with sightseeing, lunching, touring, sewing, and learning French



cooking. The cost of living was high as magazines were \$10, books \$25, and fabric had to be bought in the fabric district as there were no stores that sold it, and the topper, three bags of marshmallows for \$20.

They eventually retired and settled in Merritt Island, Florida. For 10 years after Ron died, Sharon found a traveling companion and cruised every winter for three months. Her favorite destinations were Australia, the Orient, and Alaska sightseeing the giant icebergs.

In 2012 Sharon moved to Luther Manor because of its continuum of care life plan. Sharon enjoys it here. She likes the activities Luther Manor offers. She's also an avid bridge player hoping to find more new players.

Well, Sharon, I sure enjoyed our "memory lane" visit, as I too grew up and met my husband, Jim, in Pewaukee. Reminiscencing always puts smiles in our eyes and warms our hearts. I loved this interview. Merci!




Resident volunteer **Joyce Van Valzah** shows off the items for sale in the Den of Antiquity



I was five years old and in first grade and was completing the two miles daily walk to a one room rural school near Tigerton, Wis., with my older brother and two other boys. The date was November 1st.

As we passed by a wooded area and some farm buildings, we could see the school with the white country church just behind. Looking for other kids to play with before school opened, we were taken when we spotted the fully-assembled hay wagon, complete with wooden wheels, steel rims, and the wagon tongue (on one side of the chimney), straddling the ridge of the roof of our school. I do not know who perpetrated the Halloween prank — but older high school boys volunteered to take it down.

Where did Halloween begin? The word Halloween originated with the Catholic Church from "All Hallows Eve." All "Hollows Day," or "All Saints Day," as a day for honoring saints.

The Celts believed that spirits of the dead came back on October 31st every year to mingle with the living. Not wanting to be possessed, they put out fires in their homes to make them undesirable and would dress in costumes, do destructive acts to drive off the spirits.

"Trick or Treating" may have originated in 9th century Europe with a custom called "souling", where poor Christian people on November 2nd (All Saints Day) would pray for villagers' dead relatives in exchange for "soul cakes" — square pieces of bread with currants.

Jack-O-Lanterns probably came from an Irish tale of a man named Jack, a drunkard and trickster, who tricked Satan to climb a tree and then quickly carved a cross in the trunk below, thus trapping him in the tree. Jack made Satan

promise never to tempt him again and then let the devil down from the tree. When Jack died, because of his sinful life, he was not allowed into heaven. Neither was he allowed into hell, because he had tricked Satan. However, the devil gave him an ember, to carry through cold and darkness. The ember was placed in a turnip to keep it glowing longer. When the Irish came to America, they found pumpkins to be more plentiful than turnips for their "Jack's Lanterns."

So, what are your thoughts? Are we worshiping and promoting evil? Is trick or treating teaching extortion? I leave you with the words of Jerry Wilson. (One source for this article.) Though some cults have adopted Halloween as their favorite "holiday", the day did not grow out of evil practices, and today it is only as one cares to make it.



## SCAM CALLERS Get More Sophisticated


Luther Manor has shared many times about the various scam phone calls you may receive and the dangers of them. Technology is allowing scammers to be increasingly sophisticated and tricky in their attempts to steal from innocent people.

Most recently it has been reported that these scammers are now able to have the Caller ID screen on your phone say "US Department of Social Security" when the call comes in. People see this name on the screen, assume that the call must be legitimate, and share copious amounts of personal information. Please be warned: these are scam calls!

The Department of Social Security will never call or email you! They will only contact you by US Mail Service, delivered to you by the US Post Office. This means no delivery from Social Security via Federal Express or United Parcel Service...only the official US Mail Service.

Thank you for noting this, and if you have any questions or feel that you may have been tricked by one of these calls (do not feel bad it happens easily), please let one of Luther Manor's staff members know so we can assist you in making sure nothing comes of the scam or the information you shared.


